

Kent was born June 8, 1932 in Long Beach, California, to Millard and Irene Pusser. He graduated from Santa Ana High School in 1949 and continued his education at Santa Ana Junior College, graduating in 1951.

Kent served in the U.S. Army from 1953-1955 and was stationed in France as an Ordinance Parts Specialist. Upon discharge from the Army, Kent married Nancy Brock in 1956. In 1964, Kent and Nancy moved their growing family to Santa Maria and

Is there someone in your immediate or distant family that would be interested in preserving or continuing your research? Would local genealogical societies, historical societies, or public libraries be interested in acquiring all of your research? Will they be able to understand the system you are using?

Having seen several friends acquire "boxes" of genealogy materials from relatives, I realize the task of wading through all of it is rather daunting, not to mention time consuming.

The one saving grace that we have in this day and age is the computers (can't say enough about living in this time period). Online genealogy trees, such as Ancestry.com, FamilySearch.org, MyHeritage.com, are an invaluable place to store our trees, plus memories. What a wonderful way to preserve all those family photos, videos, audios, and documents. How many times have you heard someone who has been through a fire, flood, earthquake, etc., say, "I am so sad I lost all our irreplaceable family memories"? Online "clouds" and drop boxes can help preserve and retrieve those memories in case of a disaster (or a computer crash).

Here are a few things I am trying to do, as time allows: Add that research to those trees. Scan those pictures and memories to online sources. Clean up those miscellaneous notes, pieces of paper with notes-to-self that no one else would understand. Heck, if I get rid of one piece a day, that would lfyou're be 365 in a year, right? 
